


MaXXXine (2024)

Description

A Disappointing Finale to a Once-Promising Trilogy

In 2022, Mia Goth and Ti West captivated the arthouse horror community with the <u>release</u> of *X* and its <u>prequel</u>, *Pearl*. These <u>films</u> introduced audiences to a bold new <u>cinematic universe</u>, marked by a distinct narrative <u>style</u> and a compelling central performance by Goth. *X* paid homage to '70s slasher flicks, while *Pearl* offered a twisted take on the Technicolor melodramas of Douglas Sirk. Both films were rich in style and narrative verve. However, the third installment, *MaXXXine*, falls disappointingly short. Despite its stylish <u>depiction</u> of 1980s Los Angeles, the <u>film lacks</u> the substance and narrative drive that made its predecessors so engaging.











MaXXXine picks up in 1985, with Maxine Minx (Mia Goth) now in Hollywood, chasing her dreams of stardom. The Night Stalker is on the loose, and moral panics about the corrupting influence of media are rampant. Maxine, who previously survived the carnage on the adult film set of X, is now auditioning for a legitimate film, *The Puritan II*. Despite her talent and unshakeable sense of self, Maxine finds herself entangled in a series of grisly murders targeting young women in her orbit. As LAPD detectives (Michelle Monaghan and Bobby Cannavale) and a private investigator (Kevin Bacon) close in, Maxine's journey becomes increasingly perilous.

Ti West's directorial style remains visually striking, with a keen eye for period detail. The <u>film's</u> depiction of mid-1980s Los Angeles is both lurid and authentic, capturing the grime and sleaze of the era. West's use of neon-soaked nighttime streets and bland backlots by day, combined with Tyler Bates' hypnotic synth score, evokes the films of Michael Mann and Brian De Palma. However, the film's narrative lacks the <u>depth</u> and originality of its predecessors. The story feels more like a series of stylish set pieces than a cohesive whole.

Mia Goth continues to deliver a compelling performance as Maxine, but the film's script gives her little

to work with. Maxine is transformed from a dynamic, unpredictable character into a reactive figure, stripping her of the spark that made her so captivating. Elizabeth Debicki stands out as the director of *The Puritan II*, delivering soliloquies about art and the nature of cinema. Kevin Bacon, playing a private investigator with a Foghorn Leghorn accent, adds some eccentric charm. However, the supporting cast, including Michelle Monaghan and Bobby Cannavale as detectives, is given little room to shine.

Eliot Rockett's cinematography is a highlight of *MaXXXine*, capturing the seedy allure of 1980s Hollywood. The film's opening sequence, featuring Maxine's audition in a long, single take, is visually stunning. The use of light and shadow, combined with the film's eclectic soundtrack, from ZZ Top to New Order, enhances the atmosphere. However, the film's visual flair cannot compensate for its lack of narrative cohesion.

MaXXXine is a frustrating conclusion to a trilogy that began with such promise. While the film is visually stylish and boasts strong performances, it ultimately feels hollow. The plot is thin, the characters are underdeveloped, and the film's exploration of 1980s culture lacks depth. Fans of the <u>previous films</u> may find some enjoyment in the film's atmosphere and aesthetic, but MaXXXine fails to deliver on the potential of its predecessors.
